Q4 Summary

December brings a shift in conditions for the Worldwide Vets team. In many of the regions where we work, heavy rains across the tropics and colder winter weather in Europe make fieldwork more challenging. Despite this, our teams continue to deliver vital care, adapting schedules and logistics to ensure animals still receive treatment, training continues, and projects progress wherever conditions allow.

This quarter, our teams completed a major mission in Ukraine, continued to develop our network in Egypt, delivering critical veterinary care and supporting local communities in challenging conditions. Alongside this, we focused heavily on fundraising to secure the resources needed to continue our work into 2026. The generosity of our supporters during the giving season has been incredible, enabling us to plan ahead with confidence and reach more animals in need.



WORK AROUND THE GLOBE



WILDLIFE RESCUE



This time of year is always a little quieter for the vets, as the rains to Southern Africa, making many reserves impassable for elective procedures. However, the animal rescue projects find themselves busier than ever, receiving a lot of orphaned and injured baby animals in these months.

The Wildlife Orphan Rescue project, at Free To Be Wild in Zimbabwe are all hands on deck right now, with an influx of baby animals. This means long but rewarding days for the volunteers who help with feeding and cleaning all the young orphaned animals, whilst continuing to prepare older animals for release. Just before Christmas they completed their pop-up release enclosure coming one step closer to the release of 19 rescued Monkeys!



OPERATION UKRAINE



We are delighted to tell you that not only did we reach our target of 4,000 animals this year, but we exceeded it significantly due to a heavy push in October and November.

In October our team arrived in Germany to collect a vital new piece of equipment, a donated Nissan Navara truck which will support the movement of animals to our clinics around Ukraine. In the past we have needed to rely on volunteers, and hiring drivers for this purpose so we are excited for this new development. Despite a 10-hour import process at the border, we still arrived at our 1st destination in time and the car was put straight to use moving animals. Together we undertook an intensive 2-week mission at Lev Clinic in Lviv, and then headed off to Kropyvnytskyi to do focus on helping animals living around the city dump.



The team in Lviv and Kropyvnytskyi hosted us like heroes, and worked from the start to the end of the day to welcome volunteers, register animals, fill out papers, assist our every need, and close up the clinic well after we went home each night. Thank you for being so supportive of us and your community.



In these months we were delighted to welcome back 3 wonderful volunteers: Dr Colleen Lambo, Dr Jo Westley, and RVN Soula Richards who were with us at Easter. Most days we headed home in the dark, but with a huge sense of achievement. We completed 404 cat sterilisations in this time.

The Vet Hub

One of the biggest developments of 2025 came in November, as the team launched a brand new initiative thanks to the help of our supporters. The Vet Hub is going to become a clinic in the center of the country (Cherkasy region) where a permanent veterinary base will serve as a central point for animal care, sterilisation, and rehabilitation. This hub will allow us to support animals brought in from frontline areas, provide free veterinary services, and coordinate our teams with greater capacity and continuity than ever before.

From this base we will continue our mobile work, but now better equipped for more challenging cases, and more able to take volunteers and continue to train Ukrainian vets and nurses. Alongside delivering high-impact clinical care, this hub solidifies our long-term commitment to the animals and communities affected by conflict and displacement.



This new veterinary hub will become a lifeline for countless animals caught in the ongoing crisis. It will serve as a safe space for emergency care, vaccination, sterilisation, and hospitalisation, a place where evacuated animals from the front line can finally find safety, treatment, and compassion.

Our mobile team will continue their essential work on the ground, reaching the most affected areas and delivering aid where it's needed most. But now, with this permanent base, we'll be able to do so much more, offering stability, continuity, and a stronger network of care.

In November Gemma Campling, Olha Boiko and Lisa Konovalova went to collect the keys, and begin planning the equipment needed to get this clinic ready. We still have lots of equipment to fundraise for, including surgical tables, gas anesthesia machines, and storage for our supplies. If you can help us, please don't hesitate to head here as every little is so important right now:

To every supporter, donor, volunteer, and partner who has stood by us since the first days of the war: thank you. You've helped us save lives, heal wounds, and bring hope to both animals and people in unimaginable circumstances. This new chapter represents more than just a building, it's a symbol of resilience, compassion, and the power of global kindness in action.



Veterinary Statistics

In these last 3 months in Ukraine, the Worldwide Vets team successfully treated hundreds of animals and offered a range of free services:

3057 procedures were completed, including:

- 1,491 sterilizations
- 1491 rabies vaccinations
- 260 topical parasite treatments
- 25 dogs and 300 horses dewormed
- 20 miscellaneous procedures involving emergency critical care, tumor removals, foreign body removals, traffic accidents, and animals injured by bombings

3,587 procedures

Breakdown of sterilized animals:

- 443 female dogs
- 48 male dogs
- 849 female cats
- 151 male cats



Equine Support

This year we continued our work providing free vaccinations to equines across Ukraine. We were delighted to provide another 200 rabies vaccines and 200 oral deworming syringes for horses in the Kyiv, Dnipro, Uman, and Odesa regions this quarter, taking our count to 300 dewormers and 300 vaccines for the year.

A These essential supplies are a vital step in protecting equine health, preventing the spread of disease, and ensuring that horses — many of which support families and communities in frontline and rural areas — remain healthy and able to work.

Our team vaccinated many horses around Kyiv, and other supplies were sent around to stable yards further afield with local vets so that we could ensure the vaccines and dewormers reach those animals who needed them most.



EGYPT VET CLINIC



Our new initiative to develop a vet clinic in Cairo is coming on fast. The Egypt team had a highly impactful fourth quarter, made possible by the dedication of our volunteers and the generosity of our supporters. Volunteer veterinarian Dr Jo Westley joined us for 6 weeks of training for our new team, and Dr. Colleen Lambo completed a month-long deployment alongside Dr. Justin Box. Together, they provided direct care to animals in need, strengthened community partnerships, and laid critical groundwork for our future clinic.

During this period, we partnered with Animal Protection Foundation, Summer's Place, Cat Heaven, CART Shelter, American Cairo Animal Rescue, Unleashed, and Chance, extending our reach across shelters and community sites. Emergency and field care included treating a cat struck by a vehicle, assisting an ailing dog in the local community, evaluating sites for future equine initiatives, and providing care to overworked pyramid horses. In total, 65 animals were sterilized, microchipped, and vaccinated, with an additional 41 animals vaccinated and microchipped and enrolled for future sterilization. Twelve animals received wound treatment, preventing further suffering and complications.

Significant progress was also made toward establishing our permanent clinic. Security cameras were installed, the clinic yard was prepared with poured cement, and patient care cages were set up. Thanks to donor support, this quarter delivered both immediate lifesaving care and lasting infrastructure that will expand our impact in Egypt for years to come.



GUATEMALA WILDLIFE COURSE



We are delighted to have formed a new relationship with a highly ethical and impactful team in Central America. ARCAS run one of the busiest and most advanced wildlife clinics in the area and with a high caseload, are focal to conservation initiatives in the country.

In 2026 we are partnering with ARCAS to lead a hands-on wildlife veterinary project in Guatemala from 6th–18th July. Delegates will gain practical experience caring for primates, psittacines, and reptiles, including safe capture, blood sampling, fecal analysis, treatments, and assistance with surgeries and necropsies.

The programme also includes routine animal care, enclosure maintenance, and lectures on anesthesia, transport, neonatal care, and field lab procedures. This 12-day course offers a unique chance to develop clinical skills, work alongside experienced wildlife vets, and make a real impact on conservation and animal welfare in Guatemala. THE NEW SHOP




The launch of our new website shop was a huge task, but we are pleased to now announce it is live and here you can support our work whilst enjoying some lovely stash and accessories.
